The four kinds

- lulav**
A palm branch with no fragrance but with fruit.
- avarot**
Willows that have no fruit or fragrance.
- etrog**
A fruit, like a lemon, that has a sweet fragrance and can be eaten.
- handassim**
Myrtles which have a nice smell but cannot be eaten.

Harvest

- A harvest festival is a **celebration** of the food that it grown on the land.
- In the past it was not easy to find food in water, so farmers brought the harvest in so their was enough food until the spring.
- Christians** thank God for the food as they believe God made the world and everything in it.
- It takes place on the **Sunday nearest the full moon** that happens closest to the **autumn equinox**.
- Christians bring **baskets of food** to give thanks to God.

Sukkot- Sukkah is a Hebrew word for a **tent**. Sukkot is the plural of sukkah.

- Sukkot is celebrated in **autumn** and lasts **seven days**.
- During Sukkot, Jewish people remember the time when God **freed them from slavery in Egypt**. After they left, they wandered the desert for forty days and forty nights, trying to find somewhere to settle. They built **temporary homes out of dry palms and branches**.
- The sukkah must have **three walls**. The roof must be something from the **ground**, like plants. The roof must not protect Jews from the environment as Jews **trust** that God will protect them.
- During the week of Sukkot Jews spend as much time as possible in the Sukkot. **The four kinds** are part of Sukkot.
- The **seventh day** is **Hosbana Rabbah** (The Great Help). The night before a **prayer** is said for God to judge what will happen to Jewish people in the following year.
- On Hosbana Rabbah Jews visit the **synagogue**, wave the **four kinds** and say **prayers for a good harvest**.

- There could be as many as **800,000** young carers in the UK.
- A survey in 2013 found young carers at GCSE level attain nine grades lower than average.
- In 2021 they celebrated their **25th** anniversary.
- One of their much-loved services are residential respite breaks were young carers get away for the weekend to do fun activities in nature.
