

<mark>Sukkot-</mark>Sukkah is a Hebrew word for a **tent**. Sukkot is the plural of sukkah.

- Sukkot is celebrated in **autumn** and lasts seven days.
- During Sukkot, Jewish people remember the time when God **freed them from slavery in Egypt**. After they left, they wandered the desert for forty days and forty nights, trying to find somewhere to settle. They built **temporary homes out of dry palms and branches**.
 - The sukkah must have **three walls**. The roof must be something from the **ground**, like plants. The roof must not protect Jews from the environment as Jews **trust** that God will protect them.
 - During the week of Sukkot Jews spend as much time as possible in the Sukkot. **The four kinds** are part of Sukkot.
 - The **seventh day** is Hosbana Rabbah (The Great Help). The night before a prayer is said for God to judge what will happen to Jewish people in the following year.
 - On Hosbana Rabbah Jews visit the synagogue, wave the four kinds and say prayers for a good harvest.
