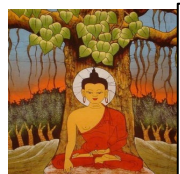


Eternal	Something that lasts forever.

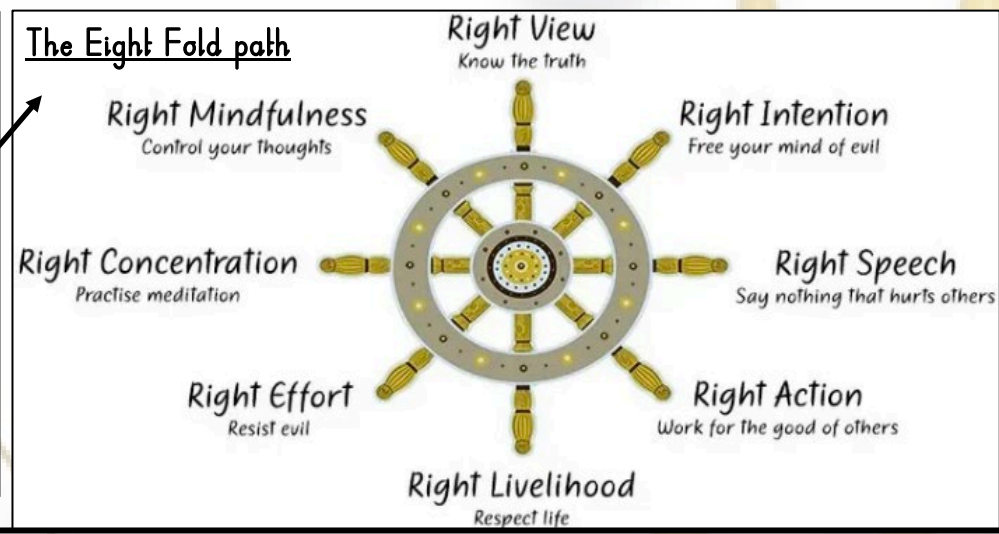


Buddhism - Siddhartha Gautama was a prince who lived a life of luxury. When he was 29, Siddhartha went outside his palace and saw people suffering for the first time. He decided to leave his palace and live among holy men in search of truth. His search took him six years, but he became enlightened while meditating under a fig tree. Following this, Siddhartha became known as the Buddha, which means the 'awakened' or 'enlightened' one. From then on, he dedicated his life to spreading his teachings.

The Four Noble Truths- Buddha's key teachings

1. Life has inevitable suffering.
2. There is a cause to our suffering.
3. There is an end to suffering.
4. The end to suffering is contained in the eight fold path.

The Eight Fold path



Holy text- Tipitaka

Tipitaka means 'three baskets' because the original Buddhist writings were on palm leaves and stored in baskets. The teachings are called dharma (truth).



Christianity- Heaven and Hell

- Heaven is described as eternity with God. It is a state of being, rather than a physical place.
- Heaven is the aim for Christians, so their soul can be reunited with God and Christ.
- Because of Jesus's resurrection, Christians believe they have eternal life after death.
- As humans have choice, people might reject God and therefore may end in eternity in absence of God, in Hell.
- Hell is traditionally shown as a place of eternal fire that symbolizes pain and suffering.

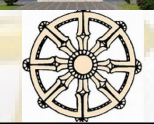
The Parable of the Sheep and Goats (Mathew 25:31-46)
