Hugh Ramapolo Masekela (4 April 1939 – 23 January 2018) was a South African trumpeter, flugel-hornist, cornetist, singer and composer who was described as "the father of South African jazz".

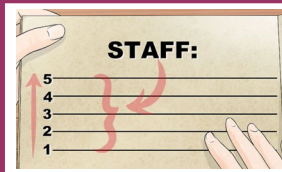

Key Music Vocabulary

pitch	The range of high and low sounds.

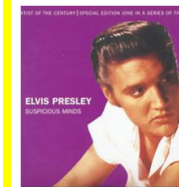

Francis Sinatra was an American singer and actor who is generally perceived as one of the greatest musical artists of the 20th century. He is one of the best-selling music artists of all time, having sold an estimated 150 million records worldwide.



Elvis Presley (January 8, 1935 – August 16, 1977), was an American singer and actor. Nicknamed the "King of Rock and Roll", he is regarded as one of the most significant cultural icons of the 20th century.



Stevland Hardaway Morris, known as Stevie Wonder, is an American who help shaped the R&B industry. Often hailed as a "musical genius", he is one of the best-selling musicians of all time.
